Answers: Chapter 8

1-2. (Opinion)

3. Fire came out from before the Lord and snuffed them out. (Opinion) God gave instruction regarding how things were to be done. (p.75)

“He, that being often reprov'd hardeneth his neck, shall suddenly be destroyed, and that without remedy” (Proverbs 29:1 KJV).

4. It burned to a crisp the bellyachers and gripers when they were gathered on the outskirts of the camp. (p.76)

5. Two silver trumpets signaled the people to move with God. The camp stopped when God stopped. (pp. 77-79) Silver trumpets called the congregation and directed the camp's movement. They signaled when it was time to come, and when it was time to go. (One trumpet called the leaders. Two trumpets called the congregation.) (p.78)

6. God promised to save them from opponents—if they would sound the alarm—*before* confronting an enemy. For New Testament believers, this means to clap, sing, and shout praises to God (in addition to sounding a trumpet (or shofar?), *before* facing an enemy. (p. 80) Blessing the Lord, instead of bad-mouthing the enemy, brings victory.
